Year C Feast of The Holy Family 26th December 2021

A Lesson in Parenting



When we hear stories about the Holy Family we are struck by the normality of Jesus' upbringing. Mary and Joseph behave like any parents of today. Secondly we are struck by the love and tenderness that surrounds Jesus in his early years. The fact that he was born in a stable and grew up with no great wealth doesn't seem to matter. What

matters is that Jesus grew up knowing that Mary and Joseph loved and cared for him.

Jesus would have been brought up in a Jewish tradition, and he would not have been expected to challenge this tradition. What is interesting for us to learn is, that by the tender age of twelve Jesus was developing a sense of who he really was. When Jesus causes his parents much distress by becoming separated from them to stay in the temple listening to the teachers, he tells Mary and Joseph, "Why were you looking for me? Did you not know that I must be busy with my Father's affairs?" Mary and Joseph don't quite understand what he means, but we are told, "Mary stored all these things in her heart." She had faith in her son, and she allowed him to become the individual she always knew he was.

Sounds easy doesn't it, yet thousands of parents today must be shaking their heads. It's not easy to let go and allow your child to be his or her own person, especially if you see them making all sorts of mistakes. Today's gospel is a lesson in parenting. Surround your children with love and caring. Pass down all the good Christian traditions you yourself have learned, then have faith and allow your child to be the person they need to be.

Let the bells ring out for Christmas!

"Oh! I wish it could be Christmas every day", so the song goes. It's a sentiment I endorse. I love Christmas. It's one of my favourite times of year. However, as the signs of Christmas seem to get earlier each year I hear myself saying, "It's too soon, it's too soon!". Only so many shopping days left we're told. Christmas merchandise fills the shelves and shops are winding up for the big shopping days, baubles twinkle and tinsel sparkles. We wait to see which of the larger shops gives the best Christmas ad. As my first Christmas card arrived I am again reminded why I wish it were Christmas every day! The message I read is powerful. "When the song of the angels is stilled, when the star in the sky is gone, when the kings and princes are home, when the shepherds are back with their flocks: the work of Christmas begins: to find the lost; to heal the broken; to feed the hungry; release the prisoner; to rebuild the nations; to bring peace among people; to make music in the heart".

How easy it is to forget what Christmas is all about. How easy to get taken up with tinsel and baubles. How easy it is to forget that God was again reaching into our ordinary lives to transform them; to bring his peace and salvation. God was reminding us again that he created us for himself and though we may have drifted, his love has no end. Christmas reminds us that we are all brothers and sisters and that we have a duty to reach out of our busyness to care for those around us. When the days drift into January and the hustle and bustle has passed, when family and friends go back to their lives we are called to remember that Christmas must make a difference. The spirit of Christmas must be brought into our suffering world. The love that Jesus brought to share must be shared. The good news the angels sing about must be the daily effort of our lives. What difference will the birth of Jesus make in my life? How will his birth change the world?

We must be changers and doers. We must take the effort and energy we put into Christmas and use it throughout the year. We must take that bundle of joy wrapped in swaddling clothes born in a manger and allow him to accompany us on our journey. The glory on the lips of the angels must be the stuff of our lives long after the last bauble is packed away. Every day must be a celebration. Christ has come, the bundle of joy grew up. He gave us the greatest news. God loves us beyond all telling. So, Let the bells ring out for Christmas!
