

Believing Without Seeing.



Have we lost our belief in what we cannot see? Do we start to pray for something but stop mid sentence feeling sure that God can't be listening. Even if he is listening, why on earth would he grant our unimportant prayers? Perhaps we cannot remember a time when a prayer was answered and so lose hope. Perhaps we have had a prayer answered but imagine it was more

likely to be some great coincidence or a stroke of luck than God at work. Today's gospel is a lesson in faith and prayer. The story starts in a place many of our prayers begin, in a place of darkness desperation and raw need. Bartimaeus, the blind beggar shows us what faith is all about. He knows that Jesus is passing by and knowing that this might be his one and only chance of a cure, seizes his opportunity. He shouts out and keeps shouting despite others telling him to pipe down. He is eager, assertive, and full of hope. Bartimaeus shows us that faith is all about believing that God can do something for us that we cannot do for ourselves; and to persist in asking. It becomes clear that the story is not just about a physical healing but a spiritual awakening. Once Bartimaeus had encountered Jesus, he must surely have embarked upon a life of commitment to Christ. So it is with our own lives. Once we have understood how Jesus works in our lives, it will become the most natural thing in the world to place Christ at the centre of everything we do.

We pray that every baptized person may be engaged in evangelization, available to the mission, by being witnesses of a life that has the flavour of the Gospel. **On World Mission Sunday (24th October 2021)** we are asked to renew our commitment to evangelisation.
